The DeKalb County Commission met in regular Session on Tuesday November 9, 2021 at 10:00 a.m. in the DeKalb County Activities Building (Courthouse Annex). Those present were President Ricky Harcrow, Terry Harris, Lester Black and Chris Kuykendall. (Due to medical reasons Shane Wootten was absent).

The meeting was called to order by President Harcrow with Mr. Ables delivering the invocation and Mr. Kuykendall leading the Pledge.

It was moved by Mr. Harris, seconded by Mr. Black with all members voting affirmatively, motion carrying to dispense with the reading of the minutes and to accept them as presented in written format.

Road Department

<u>Update</u>—Mr. Broyles stated that crews have been back on CR835 for the past three weeks and have been able to haul off about 600 loads of material that has slid down the mountainside. They are doing some undercutting as well. Crews are also finishing up with the last round of mowing and doing some brush cutting.

<u>Personnel</u>—Mr. Broyles requested permission to make the following personnel changes:

- Hire Alan Hughes (D3) to replace Norman Price who resigned in April 2021.
- Transfer Tracy Turner (yard crew) from part-time to full-time to replace James Wilson who resigned on 09/20/21 (after working less than 3 months).

Equipment

Mr. Broyles addressed the Commission and requested permission to purchase several pieces of equipment, all of which has been discussed over the past few months. The list is as follows:

- Patch Unit (purchase off Sourcewell bid) for the quoted price of \$114,549.84.
- 4000 Gal. Water Tank to be mounted on one of the patch trucks (will have to put out for bid). Mr. Broyles estimated the cost to be between \$40 & \$50 thousand.
- Liquid Asphalt Storage Tank. Cost \$7,500

Mr. Harris made a motion to approve. Mr. Kuykendall seconded the motion. All members voting affirmatively to proceed with the equipment purchases.

Bancorp Finance Resolution (2022 Mack Trucks)

Mr. Sharp stated that we would be receiving three (3) of the 2022 Mack Trucks this week and the remaining eighteen (18) in December. Mr. Sharp said that sixteen of the Trucks will be financed and made the recommendation to a adopt a Resolution to finance with BancorpSouth.

Mr. Kuykendall made a motion to approve. Mr. Black seconded the motion. All members voting affirmatively to adopt the following Resolution for Financing with Bancorp:

RESOLUTION NO. 21-1109-01

Resolution Authorizing and Approving Execution of a Contract With BancorpSouth Equipment Finance, a Division of BancorpSouth Bank

WHEREAS, Board of Commissioners (the "Governing Body") of DeKalb County, Alabama (the "Buyer"), acting for and on behalf of the Buyer hereby finds, determines and adjudicates as follows:

- The Buyer desires to enter into a Contract with the Exhibits attached thereto in substantially the same form as attached hereto as Exhibit "a" (the "Contract") with BancorpSouth Equipment Finance, a division of BancorpSouth Bank (the "Seller") for the purpose of presently purchasing the equipment as described therein for the total cost specified therein (collectively the "Equipment").
- It is in the best interest of the residents served by Buyer that the Buyer acquire the Equipment pursuant to and in accordance with the terms of the Contract; and
- 3. It is necessary for the Buyer to approve and authorized the contract.
- The Buyer desires to designate the Contract as a qualified tax-exempt obligation of Buyer for purposes of Section 265(b)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code").

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by this Governing Body for and on behalf of the Buyer as follows:

Section 1. The Contract and Exhibits attached thereto in substantially the same form as attached hereto as Exhibit "A" by and between the Seller and the Buyer is hereby approved and <u>Matt G. Sharp, County Administrator</u> (the "Authorized Officer") is hereby authorized and directed to execute said Contract on behalf of the Buyer.

Section 2. The Delivery Order is being issued in calendar year 2021.

Section 3. Neither any portion of the gross proceeds of the Contract nor the Equipment identified to the Contract shall be used (directly or indirectly) in a trade or business carried on by any person other than a governmental unit, except for such use as a member of the general public.

Section 4. No portion of the rental payment identified in the Contract (a) is secured, directly or indirectly, by property used or to be used in a trade or business carried on by a person other than a governmental unit, except for such use as a member of the general public, or by payments in respect of such property; or (b) is to be derived from payments (whether or not to Buyer) in respect of property or borrowed money used or to be used for a trade or business carried on by any person other than a governmental unit.

Section 5. No portion of the gross proceeds of the Contract are used (directly or indirectly) to make or finance loans to persons other than governmental units.

Section 6. Buyer hereby designates the Contract as a qualified tax-exempt obligation for purposes of Section 265(b) of the Code.

Section 7. In calendar year <u>2021</u>, Buyer has designated <u>\$6,000,000</u> of tax-exempt obligations (including the Contract) as qualified tax-exempt obligations. Including the Contract herein so designated, Buyer will not designate more than \$10,000,000 of obligations issued during calendar year <u>2021</u> as qualified tax-exempt obligations.

Section 8. Buyer reasonably anticipates that the total amount of tax-exempt obligations (other than private activity bonds) to be issued by the Buyer during calendar year 2021 will not exceed \$10,000,000.

Section 9. For purposes of this resolution, the amount of tax-exempt obligations stated as either issued or designated as qualified tax-exempt obligations including tax-exempt obligations issued by all entities deriving their issuing authority from Buyer or by an entity subject to substantial control by Buyer as provided in Section 265(b)(3) of the code.

Section 10. The Authorized Officer is further authorized for and on behalf of the Governing Body and the Buyer to do all things necessary in furtherance of the obligations of the Buyer pursuant to the Contract, including execution and delivery of all other documents necessary or appropriate to carry out the transactions contemplated thereby in accordance with the terms and provisions thereof.

Following the reading of the foregoing resolution, Mr. Kuykendall moved that the foregoing resolution be adopted. Mr. Harris seconded the motion for its adoption. President Harcrow put the question to a vote. The motion having received the affirmative vote of all members present, President Harcrow declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted this the 9th day of November 2021.

- Promote Zach Bell to Corrections Sgt to replace Charles Young who transferred to the jail position left by Hannah Weathers

Mr. Harris made a motion to approve the personnel changes. Mr. Black seconded the motion. All members voting affirmatively, motion carried (note: both Jerry Hall and Tim Wilson resigned with 2 weeks).

EMA

<u>Long Term Lease Agreements</u>—Mr. Posey addressed the commission requesting Ratification for the Long-term Lease agreements to secure grants for the new community facilities in the Cartersville (D1) and Kilpatrick (D2) areas. He stated that these multi-use facilities will be used for Covid related events, storage and distribution as well as Storm Shelters if needed.

Mr. Harris made a motion to authorize President Harcrow and Mr. Sharp to sign the Long-Term Lease Agreement. Mr. Black seconded the motion. All members voting affirmatively, motion carried.

COA Rural Public Transportation

Mr. Sharp on behalf of Mrs. McCamy requested approval to hire Stanley Emmett as FT Rural Public Transportation driver.

Mr. Kuykendall made a motion to approve. Seconded by Mr. Black. All members voting affirmatively, motion carried.

High Falls Grant-Engineering Resolution—Mr. Sharp stated that the DeKalb County Commission has received a grant which will provide for construction and improvements at High Falls Park. The CDBG Grant requires that an engineer assist with this project. Mr. Sharp stated that Ladd Engineering has submitted the appropriate documentation and requested the Commission adopt a Resolution ratifying Ladd Engineering Services as the Project Engineer as required by the CDBG Grant.

Grant Acceptance/Local Match Resolution—Mr. Sharp also requested the Commission adopt a Resolution accepting an \$80,000 Grant for funding through the Alabama's Recreational Trails Program and committing to a 20% local match for the High Falls Project.

ARPA Premium Pay—President Harcrow addressed the commission and audience stating that the county has received funding from ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) designated as premium pay for employees who have worked through the Covid-19 pandemic. He asked the Commission to adopt the temporary premium pay Resolution.

Mr. Kuykendall made a motion to approve. Mr. Black seconded the motion. All members voting affirmatively, motion carried to adopt the following Resolution:

RESOLUTION FOR EXPENDITURE OF AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) FUNDS FOR TEMPORARY PREMIUM PAY PROGRAM RESOLUTION No. 21-1109-05

WHEREAS, DeKalb County Alabama (the "County") has received American Rescue Plan Act fiscal recovery funds ("ARPA funds") and is charged with ensuring that such funds are expended in accordance with state and federal law; and

WHEREAS, providing premium pay to eligible County employees is an authorized use of ARPA funds; and

WHEREAS, the DeKalb County Commission (the "Commission") has determined that appropriating ARPA funds to provide premium pay to eligible County employees in response to their performing essential work during the COVID-19 pandemic is a necessary and reasonable use of these funds; and

WHEREAS, the Commission desires to establish a temporary premium pay program to provide premium pay to eligible County employees as additional compensation during certain designated pay periods.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSION as follows:

1. There is hereby established the DeKalb County Temporary Premium Pay Program (the "TPP Program") to provide temporary premium pay ("TPP") as additional compensation to eligible County employees during designated pay periods ("TPP pay periods").

2. Except as otherwise provided herein, eligible County employees are employees whose assigned work duties require them to regularly interact in person with the public or their co-workers, or to regularly physically handle items that were handled by the public or their coworkers. Elected County officials are not eligible employees for the purposes of the TPP Program.

3. Except as otherwise provided in paragraphs 6, 7, and 8 of this Resolution, during each TPP pay period, eligible employees will receive as additional compensation TPP in the amount of \$6.25 per hour up to a maximum total amount of \$1,000/month for four (4) months for full-time employees hired prior to August 1, 2021; and a maximum of \$500/month for four (4) months for part-time employees and full-time employees hired on or after August 1, 2021.

4. The TPP will consist of eight (8) pay periods from November 14 – March 5 with TPP payment being made monthly after evaluation of the 2^{nd} , 4^{th} , 6^{th} and 8^{th} pay periods.

5. TPP shall be in addition to an eligible employee's regular rate of wages and other compensation, with no reduction, substitution, offset, or other diminishment of the employee's current and prospective wages or other compensation.

6. In accordance with the provisions of the American Rescue Plan Act and rules adopted thereunder, TPP

- a. Shall not be provided for work performed while an employee is teleworking from a residence or other non-job-related location and
- b. Shall not be provided to the extent that it would increase an eligible employee's total wages and remuneration, including additional compensation for overtime pay attributable to the payment of TPP, above or equal to 150 percent of the higher of Alabama's or the County's annual average wage for all occupations as defined by the most recent the Bureau of Labor Statistics' Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics.

7. The County Commission Office is hereby authorized to expend ARPA Funds in accordance with the provisions of this Resolution for any and all additional compensation and additional covered benefits provided to employees as a result of the TPP payments authorized herein.

8. Payment of TPP, as authorized by this Resolution, shall be contingent on the continued appropriation and availability of ARPA funds for this purpose.

9. Nothing in this resolution shall prevent the County Commission from providing benefits to employees not eligible under ARPA from existing County general funds.
